Fairness implies adherence to a standard of rightness or lawfulness without reference to one's own feelings or inclinations. People of character are individuals who believe in and promote the quality of fairness.)

	Discuss the following scenario with your child: You go to the store and pay the clerk for your purchase. When you get home, you discover that you had received too much change. What is		
	the fair thing to do?		
	Think of some people you know who were treated fairly (unfairly) and discuss what could have		
	been done to change the situation.		
	Part of being fair is trying to see things as others see them. When we step into our friends' shoes, we notice that they may not see things the same way we do. Fair people know that different people see things differently and it affects the way they feel. Can you think of a time when you were treated unfairly? Or was there a time when you didn't treat someone else fairly?		
	Talk with your child about situations where fairness requires taking turns.		
	Ask your child if the rules for him/her should be the same as the rules for adults.		
	What would be a fair way to share the chores in your household? Make a list so that everyone		
	knows what his/her fair share of the work will be.
